It gives me great pleasure to welcome participants from all over Europe to the 14th taikai of the European Kyudo Federation which is being held at Frankfurt, Germany.

Attending seminars, taking exams, and participating in competition - there are different ways of practice in kyudo. As such the taikai forms an integral and important part of kyudo practice. In Japan, taikai are held for different age groups and practitioners of different levels: on the one hand high-school students fiercely compete in teams supporting their school with much enthusiasm, on the other hand the highest graded masters of the All Nippon Kyudo Federation take part in the annual taikai in Kyoto at the beginning of May. In Europe, there is a long standing tradition of holding the EKF-Taikai every second year.

The sequence of movements and the order of shooting are regulated by precise rules and while there is no longer an opponent, the archers are confronted with their selves as the target mirrors themselves in its unmoving and uncompromising condition and with the struggle for the right moment of release that will send the arrow to its mark. To hit as many arrows as possible part of the taikai but hitting can neither be the sole purpose in kyudo nor its aim. Hits shows merely the result. It is the right inner intention and an the correctness in the outer appearance that are the demands of kyudo.

Sayings such as „seisha seichu“ - „correct shooting, correct hitting“ ring true and take on their full meaning. An event like this would not be possible without the collective effort of many people. I would like to thank the German Kyudo Federation for hosting this EKF taikai. Without their hard work it would not have been possible to have this event take place. Furthermore, I extend my warmest greetings and gratitude to the taikai committee members and the judging panel for taking their time to travel to Frankfurt to supervise this taikai. Ladies and Gentlemen.

Japanese martial arts like Judo or Karate are well known in Germany and in Europe.

On the other hand Budo disciplines like Aikido or Kendo might be a little less popular.

However, Japanese archery "Kyudo" does not seem to be known by many people outside the circle of its practitioners. In my opinion this is a little unfortunate as Kyudo with its long tradition and with its many famous archers in history is also attractive as competitive sports today.

In the late Heian-era of Japanese history, the Samurai were mounted knights who had to rely on their proficiency in several techniques of self defense and weaponry. Of course, one of these techniques was handling the Japanese long bow. In the middle ages the "way of the Bow" or Kyudo, as it is called today, was an essential part of the Samurais' education. However, as Samurai were mounted warriors, shooting on horseback was also part of their education. The art to shoot an arrow on moving targets while riding a horse is called Yabusame and is still being practiced today. One of the most famous archers in Japanese history was Nasuno Yoichi – a warrior of the Minamoto clan. Yoichi was said to have been able to shoot a small flag from a boat's mast in full gallop. This must have required a lot of skill.

However, in former times as well as today, I think that concentration was one of the most crucial issues in the art of archery.

Of course, for many centuries the bow was one of the most important weapons for the Samurai. However, after firearms had been introduced to Japan by European missionaries in the 16th century, the bow became obsolete in warfare.

So, why was archery still essential for the Samurai? And why is it still kept as a tradition and in its more modern competitive form? I think that it is the physical and psychological issues which make Kyudo valuable even today. Especially as the individual achievements in Kyudo are of good use for other aspects of life.

I was pleased to learn that the Kyudo European Championships will take place in Frankfurt this year, and I hope that this competition will contribute to make Kyudo more popular in Germany and Europe.



Notes:

The times shown in the schedule are for guidance only; it is the responsibility of the teams/individuals to be ready to enter the dojo at the correct time. Any team or individual not ready, will forfeit their turn to shoot and the arrows for that round will not be counted.

The EKF team taikai follows the ANKF rules of competition:

- The shooting will be carried out in Zasha and the timing will be Kyogi no Maai. A medical certificate should be provided if this is not possible to perform the shooting in kneeling form.
- Each person will shoot 4 arrows Yotsuya per round 16 arrows in total.
- The accuracy method will be used.

For the individual competition:

- Twenty archers will be selected from the team event carried out on the 10th June.
- There will be 4 tachi of 5 persons.
- Each participant will shoot 5 rounds of 2 arrows making 10 arrows in total.
- The accuracy method will be used.
- In the case of a tie, the Izume method will be used to determine a winner.


